Cakes, preserves, marmalade, etc Do come along for coffee and a chat How many words can you create from the word HARVEST? Very soon our St Jude's Infants and Juniors will come into St Jude's to celebrate their own Harvest Festival. Previously the children have used the word "harvest" to draw attention to the significance of the season.

HARVEST is a time to give thanks to God for all that we HAVE and especially for all that we have to EAT. We remember those who do not have, because we do SHARE God's blessings equally. We remember the VAST number of those who STARVE today because so often we do not have their best interests in our HEARTS. If we are to SAVE the world from hunger, then perhaps we need to SET different priorities in our own lives.

It's a reminder that as we celebrate the abundance of the blessing we so often enjoy, there are many who go hungry because of the greed of others. And yet, Harvest in the 21st Century is also an opportunity to celebrate the work of Food Banks, Community Fridges, food recycling agencies and many other charities and initiatives seeking to address the needs of those who would otherwise go without. We are so thankful for the work of the Runnymede Food Bank on our own doorstep.

Our St Jude's Church Harvest Festival celebration is on Sunday 13th October. Do join us for our 9.30am Holy Communion Service when together we can rejoice and reflect on the joys, challenges, hopes and opportunities of Harvest 2024.

Please join us too as we celebrate St Jude's Day (a day early!) on Sunday 27th October. Jude was one of Jesus' first disciples and possibly a fisherman, so he would have had first-hand experience of the harvest of the seas. But in later life Jude took to the sea as a means of reaching others to share with them the good news of Jesus. It was a decision which would ultimately end in martyrdom along-side another of the apostles — his friend Simon.

We don't know a great deal about Jude. He's not one of the big names of the New Testament. But what we do know makes me very proud to be a part of the schools and church in Englefield Green which bear his name. Jude probably had a nick-name — "Thaddeus" which roughly means "of a courageous heart": a moniker with which most of us would be honoured to be dubbed!

Jude was also an educator, with a passion for ensuring that the gospel truths were honestly and accurately presented, and that false or misleading teaching was called out. The New Testament book he is believed to have written is one of the shortest in the Bible, but it packs a real punch! It suggests that Jude was a fearless and uncompromising man, but also a compassionate man, committed to the encouragement and protection of those dear to him. In a day and age when letters are all too rarely written and received, it is a joy to read a letter which begins, as Jude's does, with a loving greeting "Mercy, peace and love be yours in abundance".

Jude has also traditionally become known as the Patron Saint of Lost Causes. The ancient church historian Eusebius records that, while Jesus was still alive, the ruler Abgar V of Edessa, an ancient city in what is present day Turkey, succumbed to an incurable disease. Having heard of the miracles of Jesus, the ruler wrote and asked Jesus to visit him. Jesus promised instead to send one of his disciples. After the Ascension of Jesus, Jude went to visit Edessa. He laid his hands on Abgar who was healed immediately.

Jude would not be deflected from his determination to SHARE the love of God. He believed men, women and children would STARVE without Jesus, the Bread of Life, who came to SAVE the world. He reaped a HARVEST of men and women coming to faith in Jesus. He remains a role model for the church today and a testimony to the loving HEART of the Gospel. Judith Allford

With the start of October, we are well and truly into Autumn, which this year seemed to start very early and has brought us some very autumnal weather with cold snaps and plenty of rain and then even more rain.

We are lucky to have the Village Centre to go to where we can enjoy both good company and good food. The Cafe hours have now returned to normal after the summer break, and they are 9am-2pm Monday to Friday, apart from Thursday where they are open late till 5pm.

The Monday Lunch Club goes from strength to strength, offering a cooked meal and good company each week. Recent menus have included Chicken and Vegetable Pie with Braised Cabbage, followed by Apple Crisp and Custard, Crustless Quiche with Salad & Asparagus. with Vanilla & Raspberry Ice Cream and Cottage Pie followed by Tiramisu. As you can imagine these menus have proved very popular. The Lunch Club welcomes people aged 55 and over. Please email or phone us by Friday lunchtime to book your place for the following Monday. The meals are provided free, but donations are welcome to help cover costs.

The Community Fridge continues to provide our community with food that would otherwise be wasted. It is open for business on a Monday & Friday morning, from 9am till 11am. The Village Centre Community Fridge joined the St John's Eco Fair on Saturday 14th September and chatted to attendees about our Community Fridge and the Lunch Club They made scrummy bread pudding using leftover bread and gave out leaflets on how to turn surplus food into dishes for the family.

A relationship has been formed with the new Co-op in Englefield Green to collect surplus food on a Sunday and Thursday to tie in with our Community Fridge operating days. Diana Bendall
