For Everything there is a Season

How will you remember the Summer of 2024? Recently I heard these last weeks described as the "Summer of the Swifties". The incredibly talented and universally popular American singer Taylor Swift has been completing a major European Tour, including, I think, eight nights at Wembley. It would be true to say that her amazing performances, and her seemingly invincible stamina, have appeared to bring a lot of summer joy to a lot of people.

One event I shall remember is the Paris Olympics. At the time of writing, I am also looking forward to the Paralympics, which begin in a couple of days. I have been captivated by the skill and endurance of the athletes and by the many examples of joy in success and graciousness in disappointment. All of them deserve our congratulations and our admiration.

The Summer in Englefield Green has been somewhat dominated by road works and the negotiation of a temporary one-way system. But we've welcomed some hard-working and engaging workmen — all the way from north-east England! In between-times we have seen the refurbishment of our beautiful Village War Memorial and the emerging transformation of the local Spar shop into a branch of the Co-op. The latter is a reminder of everything we owe to all our local retailers. Thank you for the character and commitment you bring to the village.

Nationally we have had a change of Government, and we have also seen some of the worst city riots of recent years. Sadly, the riots seemed initially have been triggered by the overwhelmingly tragic events in Southport when three little girls lost their lives and others were injured. Ironically, they had been participating in a Taylor Swift themed dance event.

For some, the Summer of 24 will be remembered as a Summer of freedom before taking up places in higher education or embarking on a new career. We look forward to welcoming to Englefield Green a new cohort of students at Royal Holloway College, University of London. Within the College itself, members of the multifaith Chaplaincy Team will be among many people on hand greeting new arrivals and supporting them to settle into student life. Please remember especially the Revd Daniel Walker, Anglican Chaplain, and Nisar Shaikh, Muslim chaplain.

The Chaplaincy website reads: Chaplains are available to see all members of the University - students and staff, of any faith or none. We aim to support students and staff in building supportive communities of faith, where fundamental questions can be explored and a deep personal search for meaning is encouraged.

For some of us, the Summer of 2024 has raised its own questions and intensified our search for meaning in life. My heart goes out to those who have experienced these months as a time of personal loss, or have perhaps been struggling with their own illness, or the illness of someone dear. Globally, we watch on with sadness, horror and fear as escalating war dominates our headlines. Israel and Gaza, Ukraine and Russia and the very many almost forgotten conflicts elsewhere in our world – continue to rob innocent children of their futures, tear families apart, wreak immeasurable havoc in many lives and cast long, dark shadows over any hope or prospect of a world at peace.

As we begin to leave Summer behind, what will be uppermost in our minds? One of my stand-out moments from the Olympics came in the rowing when Team GB's Imogen Grant and Emily Craig won gold in the lightweight double sculls. It was the last time that would be an Olympic event. Afterwards the women were asked if they were disappointed that they would not be able defend their title. Definitely not, they agreed, because we shall always be the Olympic champions! They had won a gold medal and a constant in their changing, competitive world.

In the changing seasons of 2024 and beyond, I too look for a constant. I find it in Jesus Christ, the same "yesterday, today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). As Autumn 2024 dawns why not join us at St Jude's in celebrating the unchanging love of our ever-present God? Judith Allford
